WHAT GIFT?

When I was growing up, celebrations were especially difficult for me. This was especially true for the ones where you were expected to bring a gift. I attended celebrations, not knowing I needed to bring a gift. That was embarrassing. But the worst situation was when you showed up to honor someone, and you knew your gift was sub-par. I wasn't the richest kid on the block, but even my wrapping paper signaled that the gift wasn't all that great. Romans 12:1

Hebrews 13:15-16

Through him then let us continually offer up a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that acknowledge his name. Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God.

Hebrews 11:6
